



# HONORING DECEASED JAPANESE AMERICAN VETERANS By Rouxann Kuwata

Every Memorial Day weekend, scouts from Boy Scout Troop 719 journey to the Green Hills Cemetery in Rancho Palos Verdes to honor deceased Japanese American veterans from VFW Post 1961. The scouts arrive early Saturday morning so they can complete their work before the family and friends arrive. The scouts are given a long list of the name and gravesite locations of the veterans. They find each site and carefully trim the overgrown grass, polish the grave marker, and place an American flag in the front of the site. They then line up at attention and salute. Sometimes, family members or friends of these veterans will see the scouts and share stories of their loved ones.

This year the scouts watched a short documentary called *The Unknown Warriors of World War II* produced by David Ono. They learned of the brave and heroic deeds of the Japanese American soldiers and their incredible contribution to World War II. After the meeting, they were able to ask questions to Military

Intelligence Service (MIS) veteran Victor Abe.

Valley boys, Zack Kariya, Hawk, Jake and Grant Kuwata, Shaun Tanaka and Davis Yoshino are members of Boy Scout Troop 719 which is sponsored by Faith United Methodist Church in Torrance. The troop consists of mostly Japanese American scouts. These scouts learn important scout skills as well as their Japanese culture and heritage.

### Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition Celebrates It's One Year Anniversary

The Tuna Canyon Detention Station became a Los Angeles Historic Cultural Monument #1039 one year ago on June 25, 2013. The newly formed Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition organized a potluck lunch to celebrate the designation at the San Fernando Valley Japanese American Community Center where their monthly meetings are held.

David Scott, grandson of Officer in Charge Merrill Scott, was introduced by Dr. Lloyd Hitt who is the leader of the group and the Little Landers. Historical Society. David brought a beautiful yellow vase in a hand made box that was presented to his grandfather by Japanese immigrants for Officer Scott's fairness and kindness. A single candle flickered nearby in his memory. Nancy Takayama introduced Rose Ochi who recounted the political process spearheaded by Councilman Richard Alarcon.

Keynote speaker, Kanji Sahara, spoke about the long legislative road that Isseis endured en route to citizenship in 1952 citing the 1913 Alien Land Law that has been repealed in all states except Florida. Suzy Katsuda from NCRR noted that the Power-

point presentation was thorough and revealed little known Japanese immigration facts. Dr. David Yoo, director of the UCLA Asian American Studies Center and faculty, complimented Kanji Sahara for describing the racism and isolation that occurred before and after World War II. Nancy Gohata felt strongly that the Yonsei and Gosei should know more about the struggles of the Issei, Kanji Sahara concluded his presentation that heralded Wintersburg's important announcement by the National Trust's eleven most endangers historic sites. Tad Kowta who lived in the manse, spoke about his personal story and the importance of preserving this Japanese landmark.

Family members of the Tuna Canyon Detention Station were introduced and given a red rose in memory of their fathers. They were: Ken Furutani, Haru Kuromiya, Nancy and Patty Takayama, Jane and Matt Nishii, David Scott, Min Tonai,

Ted Yamane, and Sumi Yamaguchi. Julie Pritikan led the gathering with an original song called "Three Trees" capturing an image that Tuna Canyon's mature oaks and sycamores witnessed Tujunga's tragic history. That is, the Japanese, German and Italian immigrants, Japanese taken from Peru and others, mostly men, were imprisoned there in violation of trier civil liberties.

The Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition is truly grateful for the community's demonstrated support at the Los Angeles City Hall, the Purification ceremony, and Multicultural Panel event, Members have assisted the children of the detainees secure the enemy alien files. Michael Kinoshita of San Diego has begun preliminary renderings of the Coalition's vision creating a walking trail under the grove of trees at Tuna Canyon, Immediate memorialization as recommended by the city of Los Angeles has been delayed by the owner's lawsuit against the City of Los Angeles.

Twelve players and over thirty volunteers participated in the hour long basketball clinic that was focused on exposing to children with special needs, the joy of playing basketball. The focus was to provide a safe and fun environment for these children to have new experiences. The participants' disabilities ranged from learning disorders to physical disabilities.

The activities for the participants ranged from simply bouncing the ball, using a four-foot hoop to slam dunk, or shooting 3 pointers on a regulation hoop. The volunteers were each grouped with a participant and adjusted their interaction and support according to the participants' abilities. The participants were all smiles as they challenged themselves through physical activity and had the opportunity to spend some time with people outside of their day-to-day routine. Participant Ray Isozaki wrote in a note - "Basketball was so amazing... I did enjoy my time very well... it was so cool."

After the basketball session, the event moved to the Pioneer Room at the SFVJACC where the San Fernando Valley Hawks team sponsored a luncheon for the event. There were numerous Hawks players and parents busy at work, serving the line of hungry participants, volunteers, and coaches. Additional community support was provided by AOL Landscaping who supplied customized T-shirt for each participant as well as San Fernando Athletics and Margaret Takimoto who each supplied a four-foot hoop for the event. It was a great way to bring our community together. Watching the different groups socialize, develop relationships and have fun was what the event was really about.

Awards were presented to all of the participants after the basketball clinic. The pure joy and elation on their faces was indescribable. I think greatest reward was being able to give back to the special needs community and create and experience that they will always remember. Volunteers came from various organizations from across Southern California including some Yonsei and Rising Stars Alums!

### They Just Fade Away

On a perfect May afternoon, VFW Post 4140 hosted its traditional Memorial Day service at the CC. Commander Frank Tanaka quoted General Douglas MacArthur in his opening message to inform the audience that this would be the last such service sponsored by Post 4140. With a heavy heart, Frank announced the closing of Post 4140 and compared it to old soldiers who never die, but just fade away. This is a devastating loss for our community because it severs a tangible connection for families and friends to remember the sacrifices of its soldiers who served in the 442<sup>nd</sup> RCT, MIS, Korean War, Vietnam War and the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. There were 123 names on the honor roll and list of deceased comrades; a far

greater number than those of Post 4140 still remaining on guard. Sadly, everything of this world passes with time; that's partly why life moments are so precious and beautiful.

At age 82, retired General MacArthur accepted the Thayer Award in 1962 at the United States Military Academy at West

Point in front of the cadet assembly. General MacArthur's acceptance speech was not about him, but to honor the American soldier with powerful words from the heart of a fellow soldier. Old Wakaba would like to share the following edited excerpts from the General's speech at West Point in hope that you too will be uplifted by our soldiers' sacrifice for us.

"No human being could fail to be deeply moved by such a tribute as this, coming from a profession I have served so long and a people I have loved so well. It fills me with an emotion I cannot express. But this award is not intended primarily for a personality, but to symbolize a great moral code -- the code of conduct and chivalry of those who guard this beloved land. For all eyes and for all time, it is an expression of the ethics of the American soldier.



Duty, Honor, Country: Those three hallowed words reverently dictate what you ought to be, what you can be, what you will be. They are your rallying points: to build courage when courage seems to fail; to regain faith when there seems to be little cause for faith; to create hope when hope becomes forlorn. They build your basic character. They mold you for your future roles as the custodians of the nation's defense. They make you strong enough to know when you are weak, and brave enough to face yourself when you are afraid.

They teach you to be proud and unbending in honest failure, but humble and gentle in success; not to substitute words for



action; not to seek the path of comfort, but to face the stress and spur of difficulty and challenge; to learn to stand up in the storm, but to have compassion on those who fall; to master yourself before you seek to master others; to have a heart that is clean, a goal that is high; to learn to laugh, yet never forget how to weep; to reach into the future, yet never neglect the past; to be serious, yet never take yourself too seriously; to be modest so that you will remember the simplicity of true greatness; the open mind of true wisdom, the meekness of true strength.

Their story is known to all of you. It is the story of the American man at arms. My estimate of him was formed on the battlefields many, many years ago, and has never

changed. I regarded him then, as I regard him now, as one of the world's noblest figures; not only as one of the finest military characters, but also as one of the most stainless. His name and fame are the birthright of every American citizen. In his youth and strength, his love and loyalty, he gave all that mortality can give. He needs no eulogy from me, or from any other man. He has written his own history and written it in red on his enemy's breast.

I do not know the dignity of their birth, but I do know the glory of their death. They died unquestioning, uncomplaining, with faith in their hearts, and on their lips the hope that we would go on to victory. Always for them: Duty, Honor, Country. Always their blood, and sweat, and tears, as they saw the way and the light.

The code which those words perpetuate embraces the highest moral laws and will stand the test of any ethics or philosophies ever promulgated for the uplift of mankind. Its requirements are for the things that are right, and its restraints are from the things that are wrong. The soldier, above all other men, is required to practice the greatest act of religious training -- sacrifice. In battle and in the face of danger and death, he discloses those divine attributes which his Maker gave when he created man in his own image. No physical courage and no brute instinct can take the place of the Divine help which alone can sustain him. However horrible the incidents of war may be, the soldier who is called upon to offer and to give his life for his country, is the noblest development of mankind.

The long gray line has never failed us. Were you to do so, a million ghosts in olive drab, in brown khaki, in blue and gray, would rise from their white crosses, thundering those magic words: Duty, Honor, Country.

This does not mean that you are warmongers. On the contrary, the soldier above all other people prays for peace, for he must suffer and bear the deepest wounds and scars of war. But always in our ears ring the ominous words of Plato, that wisest of all philosophers: 'Only the dead have seen the end of war.'


The shadows are lengthening for me. The twilight is here. My days of old have vanished -- tone and tints. They have gone glimmering through the dreams of things that were. Their memory is one of wondrous beauty, watered by tears and coaxed and caressed by the smiles of yesterday. I listen then, but with thirsty ear, for the witching melody of faint bugles blowing reveille, of far drums beating the long roll."
