





Christmas Bells by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

During my research for another story, I came across an article regarding the origin of the Christmas carol "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." This popular carol was inspired by a poem, "Christmas Bells," by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Even though Christmas has passed, I felt that the back story about Longfellow was noteworthy and possibly of some comfort to those who have lost loved ones.

The Christmas season is traditionally a time for family, reflecting on the blessing received during the past year, eating too much, and going to parties and gatherings. Yet, for many people, like Longfellow himself, personal tragedies make Christmas a particularly painful reminder, akin to ripping off the scab from a wound. It bleeds anew. Longfellow's poem, "Christmas Bells," does not sugar coat the deep personal problems we encounter in life, but it renews our hope in bringing light to the darkness.

Even though he was one of America's most acclaimed poets, he did not escape personal tragedy. On July 9, 1861, his beloved wife, Fanny, burned to death in an accident in their home. She was apparently using a candle to melt sealing wax to close an envelope containing a locket of one of their daughter's hair. In the midst of melting the sealing wax, she set her gauzy dress afire. Longfellow was awakened in the next room by her screams, but in his futile efforts to put the flames out with his own body to save his wife, he suffered burns to his arms, hands and face. Fanny fell into a coma and died the next day.

He was not able to attend his precious wife's funeral because of the severity of his burns. Later, to hide his facial scars, he grew the beard that gave him the wise, distinguished look captured in so many later paintings and photographs of him. The scars on his face had made shaving very difficult, so the beard was more of a necessity than vanity. Over time, his physical wounds healed, but there were inner scars and deep anguish within his soul. There were long periods of silence, except for a letter to his sister-in-law, Mary Appleton Mackintosh, a month after Fanny's death. In the letter, Longfellow revealed the depth of his hurt. The letter read, "How I am alive after what my eyes have seen, I know not. I am at least patient, if not resigned; and



thank God hourly - as I have from the beginning - for the beautiful life we led together, and that I loved her more and more to the end." He kept this pain quietly within him until he wrote "The Cross of Snow" eighteen years after Fanny's death. He wrote, "These eighteen years, through all the changing scenes and seasons, changeless since the day she died." For those of us who have lost loved ones, this mystery of "changing yet changeless" is familiar, but hard to describe. We lift up the Asaoka, Kajiki, Suenaka, Takimoto families and others who have recently experienced the loss of a loved one.



On Christmas Day in 1863, Longfellow wrote "Christmas Bells" after listening to the church bells ring. Even though the Civil War was raging and the pain in his own heart from the loss of Fanny was so real, he still clung to the promise of a better future. His famous poem begins:

I heard the bells on Christmas Day Their old, familiar carols play, And wild and sweet The words repeat Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

The forth stanza captures Longfellow's anger and hopelessness about the Civil War which included his son, Charles, who was wounded and almost paralyzed while serving in the Union Army.

"Then from each black, accursed mouth The cannon thundered in the South, And with the sound The carols drowned Of peace on earth, good-will to men!"

The poem then gracefully turns to Longfellow's deep faith in God and the promises that good will prevail over all evil. God is the only answer to all our emptiness and he is the giver of perfect peace. Longfellow continues:

"And in despair I bowed my head; 'There is no peace on earth,' I said; 'For hate is strong, And mocks the song Of peace on earth, good-will to men!'

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: 'God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; The Wrong shall fail, The Right prevail, With peace on earth, good-will to men.'"

Romans 8:28 reads, "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." Our life experiences certainly tell us that not everything that happens to us makes us feel good.

That is because we live in a fallen world where evil reigns. This verse assures us that God uses every circumstance that we face for our long-range good. God's plan may not specifically include our happiness for all occasions, but he has a unique purpose for each of our lives. Henry Longfellow embraced this hard lesson during his years of sorrow. We may not understand what God has in store for our futures, but we should hold fast to his promises and the faith that he has given to us. Faith in God is not a leap into the dark; it is a response to the light.

LAUREN TAGUCHI MEMORIAL YOUTH SERVICE SCHOLARSHIP

The Lauren Taguchi Memorial Youth Service Scholarship is given to honor her memory as an active member of the SFVJACC Athletics as well as many other community organizations. As a student athlete, Lauren was a role model, friend and teammate who demonstrated sportsmanship on and off the court. A \$500.00 award will be given to the graduating high school senior who best demonstrates the spirit of volunteerism and citizenship, through community service. Applicants should be responsible students, active in school and in their community, as well as participated in SFVJACC Athletics for at least 5 years. The student selected will receive the award to be applied towards his or her college education. The scholarship will be awarded at the SFVJACC Athletics Jamboree.

Evan Niizawa Memorial Continuing Education Scholarship

The Evan Yoshio Niizawa Memorial Continuing Education Scholarship is given in memory of his accomplishments, scholastic excellence and participation in athletics in the face of severe illness and life challenges. 


