More than one hundred families sacrificed everything so that today, sixty years later, nine hundred fifty families have a safe place to thrive. In 2020, it is still incredulous to think of determination and grit it took to build our center. The dream started in nearby homes during the challenging post war resettlement period. Their mission was to preserve the Japanese culture and to promote the Japanese American experience through education, events, and activities. Fortunately for us, it became a reality that we have enjoyed for sixty years.

With these dreams the families began to gather for community picnics as seen in 1955 photos with vintage cars in the background. Bravely they began to draw up plans and went about making a tanomoshi (money pooling) realizing that together they would be stronger. Present on January 11, were the honorable founders George Tsukashima (first Treasurer), George Murakami, Kinya Tatsumi and Sekai Yamanouve.

We gather here today because of the amazing foresight, hard work, financial sacrifices and commitment for the future generations by the founders of San Fernando Valley Japanese American Community Center.

Growing up in ELA we had no centers like this. I can't imagine our founders picking up their lives after internment, struggling to make a living, and providing for their families. They had the vision to look to the future and provide a place where families could meet and play safely while preserving the Japanese Culture.

Our pioneers didn't have a forty hour work week. It was many more, then after work they came together to help build the CC. For the past year we have tried very hard to identify all of our founders. Despite our efforts we have probably missed someone. All our living founders and descendants here today represent all those amazing men, women and children who built

the center.

Now fast forward to today. Although times have changed, the main goal is the same as the founders. That is to have a place for our children, grandchildren, friends, and neighbors.

The Future Planning Committee has met for three years, sent out a survey, and conducted two focus groups to discuss the need and feasibility for a multipurpose building. It would be space that would be used for large groups, judo tournaments or regulation basketball games. There would be a raised stage for performances and several classrooms. Nothing will be built without board approval and substantial funds raised to ensure its success.

In 2020, following the lead of the founders, we know that we are stronger together. We want organizations to feel at home and have a chance to enjoy the community center together.

In Memory of Son and Brother, Todd Matsuda





OLD WAKABA



Home

What are the reasons you call Southern California home? There's probably hundreds of different answers if one asks and some will say that another place is called "home". It's like trying to explain what "beauty" is -- it's all in the eye of the beholder. Commonly, there is an emotional attachment to an area because that's where someone was raised or where their family lives. Enjoying where we live is far more important to our well-being than we may think. Practical reasons for where we live like proximity to work, good schools or Costco are fine for a time, but they are not generally satisfying over the long haul. Discovering areas of attachments help us to understand why we live where we do.

For me, it's not so much the stores, restaurants, schools, or work that caused me to remain in the Valley, but the comfort and familiarity of the area itself. There's that welcoming feeling when returning from LAX on the 405 Freeway when the whole Valley sparkles in late night splendor as my old Camry starts coasting down into the Valley. There are other familiar landmarks of my youth like the Steam Plant in Sun Valley with its four red and white smoke stacks that can be seen for miles. The gravel pits, public dumps and junk car lots that littered much of Sun Valley are unsightly but integral parts of my home identity. The brown foothills above Sylmar, Lake View Terrace and Sun Valley on a clear day whisper stories of long ago Issei farmers and flower growers looking up at those same hills while working the land to make a home for themselves and the Japanese-American generations to come.

Of course it's the people who really make somewhere a home. I remember many of the adults at the CC when I was a kid, who committed their time and resources to build the gathering place that we still enjoy today. It's not the buildings, but the

people who for generations have given life to the place. Many of the men who strived to make the vision of the CC a reality before and after its incorporation in 1951 were honored at the installation ceremony in January. This is a place where all age groups have the opportunity to meet others to form relationships, some lasting a lifetime as mine have. Socialization has the added benefits of discovering the best place to buy things for less, receiving recommendations for doctors and dentists, and finding a person to play mahjong with. The CC was a place where a boy could learn judo from Sensei Seigoro Murakami, who was one of the highest ranking judo instructors in the United States by the 1960's. Visiting Murakami-sensei at his Sego Nursery in North Hollywood, dressed in street clothes was so different than the formal discipline at the dojo. His sons, Roy and George, did the heavy work back then while the rest of the family, including the grandkids, who are now running the nursery today, all contrib-

uted to the business. My dad would also take my brother and me to the Hashimoto Brothers Nursery in Arleta to purchase plants for our next landscaping job, where the Hashimoto sons, Toji and Hiko, toiled in the hot Valley sun. Today, that nursery is gone, but now Nikkei Senior Gardens stands on the property through the generous donation of the Hashimoto family. Nikkei Senior Gardens is another example of a wonderful community for seniors who thrive by nurturing new relationships and connections with other residents. The Executive Director of NSG, Mike Motoyasu, and staff make it a priority that the residents feel at home there.

The CC fosters a sense of belonging to a community that goes beyond the past Japanese -American neighborhood enclaves of Allegheny Street in Sun Valley, Blythe Street in North Hollywood, Bromwich Street in Pacoima and others. These were neighborhoods where kids just like me had plenty of room to ride their bikes, play football in the street, eat cuttlefish

without anyone complaining, and fly kites on windy days. In vacant lots or in backyards, kids

would sometimes dig huge holes as forts that were large enough for kids to stand up in without being seen from the street. On empty patches of land all the way up to Hansen Dam, wildflowers would bloom with bright yellows and purples after the winter rains. I truly miss those childhood images.

There was the miniature golf course on Laurel Canyon just west of Sheldon Street where the neighborhood kids would go when they saved a few quarters from gardening work with their dads. There were also trampolines at ground-level which were fun as long as you didn't bounce off course and hit the concrete apron. Ouch!



Some dads were not gardeners and worked at Lockheed Aircraft, General Motors, Litton Industries, Rocketdyne, Libra Scope or other emerging technology industries. These economic drivers built up the middle class in the Valley and spurred homebuilding that spread over the land that was once vegetable and flower farms run by Issei and Nisei families. Most of the aforementioned places are gone or drastically changed since I was a kid, but they hold me to the Valley.

There is something magnetic about home. It always draws us back. Do you remember when you were a kid and stayed over at a friend's house for the first time and longed for home? Did you miss your old room when you first went away to camp or college and had to share a room with strangers? King David ends the well-known Psalm 23 in saying, "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever." David realized that God promises that all things that would happen to him will be for his eternal good; even trials and trouble, though unpleasant, would ultimately be for his benefit. Although David lived in a variety of abodes from caves to palaces during his life, his true home was not in any of those locations. He looked forward to living in God's house. God's eternal home is the heaven we certainly don't deserve, but one that is freely given. All we must do is come to him earnestly; and then, we will be home at last.
