Honoring The Founders At The 60th Anniversary Luncheon

The early founders of our Center left Japan and immigrated to the United States for a bright future. Today, yonsei and gosei enjoy the fruits of their labor.

In 1951, although some of the Japanese and Japanese Americans were still living in trailer camps located at Winona and Hollywood Way in Burbank as late as 1956, the Issei and Nisei raised \$30,000 to buy 4 1/2 acres of land. Many took laborious jobs as gardeners as they resettled after World War II.

We have two black and white panorama pictures of the picnics held in 1952 and 1953. It's an interesting picture with vintage cars in the background and smiling faces with expressions of hope for a better tomorrow.

By May 1959, ground was broken for a Memorial Hall now affectionately known as the gym. A huge crowd gathered on December 12 to celebrate the new building. Some remember playing in the dirt and looking across the street at the George Oda farm.



Remembering Dr. Bo T. Sakaguchi

Bo Sakaguchi's mother was a teacher who had a vision for for her children despite working from dawn to dusk doing stoop labor. Young Bo was in the 11th grade at North Hollywood High School when his family was

forced to leave the farm and friends behind. While in Manzanar, he tragically lost his father and sister. Regardless, Bo's oldest brothers became dentists and the next two were medical doctors. So when it was time, Bo went to USC dental school and joined the family practice in San Fernando.

Later, he and lifelong friend, Mas Okui, taught teachers and retold stories, attended the Manzanar Pilgrimages, and attended its exhibits. Bo and his wife, Iku, supported the SFVJACC,SFVHBT, and SFV JACL in many ways but especially with scholarships.

Sadly, Dr. Bo passed away on April 3, 2018.

There's a gap on Monday at the Bridge table, Senior Hot Meals, line dancing, and mahjong at the back of Sakaguchi Hall, named after his brother, Sanbo. We miss his impish smile and kindness.

San Fernando Valley Japanese Language Institute





Wheatfield with Crows

We talk about it all the time, but we never seem to be satisfied with the weather. It's too hot, too cold, too smoggy or too windy. Some say that there are no real seasons here in Southern California and every day is beige, but there are some days in autumn when splashes of color paint our skies with brush strokes that not even Van Gogh could equal. There are intense sunsets with streaks of oranges and reds in a fiery mix that sear into the scattered clouds above.

The leaves of the liquidambars along parkways and in front yards respond to the cool moisture of the night by going out with an explosion of color. These are not the brilliant autumn colors of New Hampshire or the vibrant yellows of aspens in Colorado, but it does at least contribute a few days of splendor for those who hunger for seasons. Many of us at the CC have persimmon trees in our backyards. Not only are we blessed with the delicious fruit when the squirrels leave us some, but also with the brilliant reds and oranges of the leaves just before the trees shut down for the winter. Autumn is a time to slow down, to listen, to ponder deeper things than our workday lives and to walk softly on fallen leaves. This nurturing gap between summer and winter reminds us of the fleeting nature of beauty and how it's to be savored and saved in the memories of life.



Raking leaves in the fall is said to be therapeutic in connecting oneself to the rhythm of the season. Based on my leaf raking experience while helping my dad's landscaping business when I was a kid, it was just more work and it continues to be the same today. After I've raked the fallen leaves into neat piles in the backyard, the crazy dog senses a squirrel hiding within each pile and sets out to seek and destroy. Among the things I love about fall are the gentle breezes; so refreshing, and hard enough to blow the leaves in my front yard into my neighbor's.

Autumn gives birth to clear mornings, stunning sunsets, and nights lit by starry skies. Its winds will lift multi-colored leaves to ride the currents and then deposit them gently to earth. It's a message from God to this busy, troubled world saying, "Look away from today's worries and take the time to enjoy what I have created for you."

Vincent van Gogh loved these kinds of days. He understood that we are just sojourners in this world of color and forms that offer us so much beauty in amazingly different ways. The earth in all of its glory is God's creation and all one has to do is to simply look. Van Gogh was a post-impressionist painter whose work highly influenced 20th century art. His paintings are praised today for their beauty, emotion and color. His personal life, however, was a struggle with mental illness and he remained poor and virtually unknown throughout his life. He died in France at the age of 37 from a self-inflicted gunshot wound, but not before leaving his mark in history by his use of oil and canvas to convey his understanding of the world. Vincent saw the beauty.

Van Gogh is a part of this article because of a mundane moment while looking through the clearance posters at Michael's on Chatsworth Street in Granada Hills. I came across a marked-down reprint of Van Gogh's masterpiece, Wheatfield with



Crows, which was striking to me. We did not purchase it because I'm too cheap and there's no place to put it in our home, but I felt a calming, mesmerizing draw to it. The composition is of a threatening sky with different intensities of blues and menacing clouds, with black crows flying both toward and away from you at the same time, and a dead end path going through the middle of the painting. Art commentators say that this painting expresses deep sadness and a window into Van Gogh's emotional state in the last months of his life. Whatever you feel about paintings or other works of art may reflect the inclinations of your heart. Some may see beauty in the world in everyday places and scenes, while others may feel that there is no time in this hectic life to contemplate non-productive things like paintings because of the

demands placed upon them. When was the last time you took a moment to just look?

Art is like weather, it's all in the eye of the beholder. A certain piece just grabs hold of you as if it was created especially for you. Art museums can be a hassle with the jostling crowds, especially when someone blocks your view or when groups of tourists descend like locusts. But, sometimes an almost magical moment happens when the surrounding crowd and the noise fade away as you let the beauty, emotion and color of the work wash over you and fill your senses and your soul. One doesn't have to go to a museum or rummage through the clearance posters at Michael's to find something that resonates within your inner being. God's glory fills the earth and all one has to do is pause for a moment and look.

Psalm 121:1-2 says, "I lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." It's always wise to look to the strong for strength. To look elsewhere is to search in vain for something or someone who will not provide what we need. Satan wants us to keep our eyes on our sorrows and the ugliness of the world so that we may become discouraged, wallow in self-pity and curse God. But when we really look to see the beauty that is present all around us; in a child's laughter, ripe strawberries, or mountain streams, this causes our eyes to be lifted up to the eternal hills of heaven. That's where God is and where he wants our hearts to be. All one has to do is look to him.
